2019 Fall Storm






2019 Fall Storm Numbers

- October 9 13: Five days of storm
- EOC activation October 10 25: 15 days activated
- Up to 35 cm of snow and 80 km/h wind gusts
- 30,000 residents without power
- 10% of Winnipeg's tree canopy damaged
- EOC over 1000 hours by City staff
- Response over 10,000 by City Staff
- 4300 calls to 311 and 2600 calls to WFPS
- 3000 tonnes of storm related debris

2019 Fall Storm EOC Activation

- October 9 13 = Five days of storm
- EOC activation October 10 − 25 = 15 days activated
- Level 1 Activation: October 10
- Level 2 Activation: October 11 18
- Level 1 Activation: October 19 25
- Activated Incident Management System to organize
- Daily Situation Reports and Operational Briefings
- Scheduled/Organized Operations closed at the end of day and predictably slowed down




2019 Fall Storm Actions

- Situational Awareness

- Closures of City run programs and facilities
- Public Messaging
- Developed Reception Centre plan
- Mutual Aid with partner cities
- Liaison with partners
- Coordinate Wellness checks




COVID-19 Response Numbers

- Activated from March 5 2020 June 16 2022 (833 days)
- 100,000+ Virtual Meetings by 1800+ Virtual Employees*
- 123,000 library curbside pick up items
- 17,000 inquiries to 311*
- 70,000+ Emails to EOC*
- 166 Situation Reports
- 157 Activity Summaries
- Mask Distribution:
 - 260,000 disposable non-medical masks
 - 6500 medical masks
 - 7400 cloth masks







Is it all just a Planning Unit?

- Shift from a Command Structure to an Advanced Planning one but not in the traditional sense
- Intelligence and awareness were critical
- Advanced Planning (predicting and understanding the current state) was essential
- Logistics, Ops and Finance all had important cameos but were supporting actors
- Planning remained a consistent presence throughout
- At times, Planning was close to the only function



Testing Sites, Vaccine Sites and Vaccine Buses Oh My!!

 Base principle: the City would partner to support the Province in COVID response efforts wherever possible and within scope.

Testing Sites

- The ask: City facilities to set up testing sites.
- Initially not a lot in the way of requirements to help in determining appropriate sites.
- Using COVID response structure and EM systems – EMCC (departmental reps).
- Lesson learned: as the event went on and more Provincial staff were engaged, the asks and requirements were refined.



Testing Sites: Spring of 2020

- Solution: community facilities closed.
- Accessible and usable with no programming going on. No staff or community impacts.
- St. James-Assiniboia
 Centennial Pool and
 Sergeant Tommy Prince
 Place.





Testing Sites: Summer 2020

- With restrictions lifted, community facilities were allowed to reopen and were needed for delivery of community services.
- Worked on alternate City facility options.



Testing Site Support – Ongoing

- Vacant City facilities.
- •604 St. Mary's Road.
- Facility upgrades /retrofits.
- Short-Term Use Agreements

- 125 King EdwardStreet




What about our jobs? — Normalization of an Activation

- At some point, regular EM work has to resume
- While activated, we've passed our first Emergency
 Management Bylaw, developed and have established the
 Community Emergency Advisory Committee and refreshed
 and rebranded Ready Winnipeg into online material
- Rotating through COVID-19 activation roles and regular work
- Knowing when to say "too much"
- Letting go when it is too much

Heat Relief Tent – June 2020

- Due to public health restrictions, normal extreme heat response measures (i.e., opening indoor spaces) could not be used.
- Direction: solve for 'X' ...
- Adaptive EOC response:
 - Explore alternate solutions.
 - Consider: need, vulnerability, logistics, operations, staffing, after hours storage, partnerships.
 - Solution: utilize outdoor space.

Heat Relief Tent – June 2020

- Additional considerations:
 - Based on heat forecast, approvals go live asap.
- Leverage existing emergency management infrastructure, systems and processes.
 - Departmental reps EMCC members.
 - Public Works, Parks, Community Services.
 - Quick procurement and financial approval mechanisms – bottled water, tent rental, overtime.


- Urgent problem solving 101 ...

'Snowmageddon' 2022 and Flood Risk





April 24, 2022 Precipitation Forecast



2022 Spring Flood

- Unique flood season.
- Never ending string of Colorado Lows.
- Red River at James Ave = 6.5 feet (normal).
- March 26, 2022: Red River goes over 6.5 feet James.
- August 1, 2022: Red River stabilizes around
 6.5 James Ave.
- 129 days above normal levels.



2022 Spring Flood


- April 23, 2022: Red River goes over 16.0 feet James Ave.
- •June 19, 2022: Red River drops below 16.0 James Ave and slowly declines to normal.
- 58 days above 16 feet James Ave normal levels. Never higher than 18.8 ft.
- Strain on flood infrastructure running that long and those levels.
